Faces of the/our Faith A Summer of Stories

At the UCC Wisconsin Southeast Association Meeting we had the opportunity to share stories. We learned from a pastor in Chicago who co-found a church called Gilead whose theme and mission is "True stories that save lives."

That's not how we usually think about stories, as something that can save lives. But the telling and hearing stories is at the very heart of what it is to be human. We can find each other in our stories, learn from each other, celebrate together, grow together. In stories we are able to be vulnerable, to be fully seen and known, and then accepted and loved.

This summer we are going to look at some of the lesser known and lesser told stories in the Bible. There will be characters you think you know but we've never focused on, there will be characters you've never heard of, there will be fuller stories of characters you've only seen part of.

We will learn from these characters and their stories. But I hope that we will learn from each other as well, that we can tell stories and get to know each other in new ways. We'll hear stories that connect to our own, stories that will surprise us, maybe even stories that will save lives.

So what are your stories? Who are the characters who have influenced your story? Will you share?

Sign up to share a story of someone who has impacted or changed your life! Share a story of someone who has influenced you, your life, your purpose, your faith. This could be someone you've known really well, who you met briefly, who you read about. Write and share a 2-5 minute story of what they were like, why they were important to you, how they influenced you today or who you are becoming.

Some guiding guestions:

- When/when/how did you meet?
- When did you really get to know them?
- What characteristics were attractive?
- Was there a single moment that impacted you? What was that like?
- Was it over years that they impacted you? Was it a teaching? a characteristic? a value?

Guiding ideas for a telling story:

- Your story should be true as you remember. Don't let exact facts get in the way of you truth!
- Put words in people's mouths: use quotes instead of describing what they said.
- Focus on a moment or a single idea across time.
- Add details that set the story in a time and place. What did you touch, see, smell, taste?
- But also, part of what makes a story good is editing, you don't need every detail!

the earthquakes in Turkey and Syria. We were able to collect \$368.00.

For the month of May, we have been collecting for the National Alliance for Mentally III, (NAMI) of SEWI. This organization offers free resources, education, and support to anyone who needs it, whether families of those needing help or individuals with mental health concerns. Our church is lucky enough to have a speaker from NAMI who will be giving a presentation on the organization after church on Sunday, May 21. Please continue to give to this much needed non-profit.

Our Singing Bowl donations for June will go to RIP Medical Debt (A Nation that Cares Campaign supported by UCC Conference). Medical debt is one of the clearest examples of unjust debt in the United States today. More than 1 in 3 Americans struggle to afford the cost of their medical care – and it's the leading cause of bankruptcy.

No one chooses to become sick, have a chronic illness, or be in an accident. These are debts of necessity. RIP Medical Debt is able to abolish debt by mimicking forprofit debt buyers by using fundraised dollars to purchase medical debt in large, bundled portfolios for pennies on the dollar. One dollar donated erases an average of \$100 of medical debt. The emotional weight and toxicity of unpaid medical bills affects both insured and uninsured people.

UCC donations from past campaigns for RIP helped to abolish over \$104 Million of medical debt. Our church donated money to RIP during their earlier campaign and was a part of that abolished debt. Once again, with our Singing Bowl, and in partnership with many other congregations across the nation, we can ease the



burdens of many Americans who walk into a care facility with hope for healing and walk out with staggering medical bills.
