How is your Lent going?

I overheard a woman talk about her early Lent gathering and giving up meat, only eating fish during Lent. This older Irish woman proclaimed, "It's supposed to be hard! In Ireland, the fish was terrible. In Wisconsin, you've perfected the fish fry!" Sometimes I think Lent can be like that, we give something up, or add something, because it's good for us to eat less sweets, drink less soda, read a devotional, or spend more time in prayer. We sometimes use Lent to freshen up our already forgotten New Year resolutions. It is suppose to be hard, maybe even hurt a little.

Lent serves many purposes but I think two are most important: wholeness and solidarity.

Lent is a chance to reflect our lives, our actions, where we need forgiveness and to forgive, what are the crutches and things we are quietly tied to, some inner truth we're trying to avoid. Do you always need something playing in the background? What are you trying to avoid in the silence? Do you find a drink or an extra snack at the end of every day? What are you trying to fill? There is new life at the end of Lent, there is resurrection. While these reflections can happen any time of the year, we set time aside in this season to set our direction right and grow more in wholeness. We grow in the that wholeness when we live in reconciliation with

each other, building the wholeness of community, learning and practicing life together.

There is a long tradition of giving something up at Lent, I'm not discounting that. It is to remove the obstacles between us and the Divine (toward wholeness), and the obstacles between us and the world. Jesus knows what it is to suffer, to face abuse and abandonment and death. What we give up, or become aware of, at Lent ought to put us in solidarity with the poor, those who are struggling, those facing abuse or violence. How might fasting from food for a day a week or eat simply during Lent bring you to prayer and care for those who are food insecure? How might giving up alcohol bring to mind and care for those who face abuse by a domestic partner, particularly when they are drunk? How might giving up fancy coffee drinks bring to mind the coffee pickers around the world (often children) and perhaps that money could be given to a supporting cause?

There are a lot of ways to Lent. For the month that is left, perhaps we could lean into it, try something, be uncomfortable, eat the terrible fish, draw closer to God, and see the world anew.

May your Lent be a blessing to you and all that God loves.

poverty, you are part of the immediate response and of the long-term recovery.



Beginning in March, our Singing Bowl donations will benefit the UCC's Global Hope fund for Disaster Response and Refugee support. The Global H.O.P.E. team in United Church of Christ Wider Church Ministries brings together the

UCC's refugee and migration ministries, volunteer engagement, disaster response and recovery, and sustainable development support. The acronym H.O.P.E. makes clear the team's vision: Humanitarian. Opportunities. Progress. Empowerment.



2023 was an eventful year for Family Promise of Waukesha County. In partnership with Hebron Housing services, the emergency overflow shelter opened and Emmanuel conitnued to provide a meal

once a month.

Beginning in April, The Community Shelter began providing services for families experiencing homelessness. Emmanuel was one of 31 partner organizations with 250 trained volunteers providing meals and hospitality. This year the shelter has served 27 households which included 98 individuals, 66 of which were children.

The Prevention Program which provides assistance with rent, utilities and car repairs served 75 households this year, made up of 255 individuals, including 150 children.

In addition five leased apartments were filled with families at all times. This was a record year for helping families, 102 households or 353 individuals.

Thank you to everyone who has participated in serving our homeless families in some way, providing food, serving fod or donating money to the program.
